#### NSECE Purpose: Address Key Policy Needs

- Comprehensive national data
- Match parental needs and preferences and availability of providers at the local level
- Profile all families with age-eligible children in a location
- Document all care in that location
  - Center-based providers to children not yet in kindergarten
  - Home-based providers to children under age 13 years
- Characterize early care and education (ECE) teachers and caregivers
- Describe place-based aspects of child care provision/use





# National Survey of Early Care and Education Design

- An integrated set of surveys conducted in 2012 with
  - Households with children under 13
  - ➤ Home-based providers regularly providing early care and education to children under 13
  - ➤ Center-based programs providing early care and education to children not yet in kindergarten
  - Center-based classroom-assigned staff





### **NSECE Household Survey**

- Nationally representative data from 11,629 households with 21,665 children under 13
- Collected January-June 2012
- One adult respondent, usually mother
- Oversample of households in lowincome areas





## Household Survey Components

- Individual data for each child under 13
- Nonparental care calendar for prior week
- Work-related calendar for prior week for all parents or resident caregivers
- Household characteristics
- Perceptions of care and recent search





# ECE Arrangements in the NSECE

- An early care and education
   arrangement is a child-provider pair
  - ➤ Child is under 13 years
  - ➤ Provider is not the child's parent, but not regular K-8<sup>th</sup> grade school
  - ➤ Care may be
    - » Paid or unpaid
    - » regular (at least 5 hours weekly) or not
    - » in child's home or not





# Sources of Information about ECE Arrangements

- Provider Roster
  - ➤ type of care questions about each provider used last week or usually (not last week) [C1,C3-C7,C8-C9]
  - ➤ Distance from home to provider [C7-C8]
- Child Calendar nonparental care schedule last week [C2]
- Cost of care and subsidy receipt [Section E]





# Information Available Varies across Arrangements

Type of Information	Regular arrangements used in prior week	Irregular arrangements used in prior week	Regular arrangements not used in prior week

<sup>\*</sup> Regular care takes place at least 5 hours weekly.

# Units of Observation for Each NSECE Household

- Up to 9 children under 13 in the HH
  - > Is child x in any center-based care?
- Up to 12 ECE providers for the HH
  - ➤ How far is this provider from the HH?
- Up to 9\*12 arrangements per HH
  - ➤ How much do parents pay for this child at this provider (the arrangement)?
- At the HH-level
  - ➤ What is this household's weekly out of pocket cost for regular ECE?








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## **Type of Care**

### **Provider Roster Variables**

- Organization or individual
- Prior personal relationship with provider
- Care in child's home or elsewhere
- Single-type activity provider
- Drop-in care
- Payment status
- School/non-school
- Regular or irregular care





### Regular Nonparental Care

Aggregate Type of Care	Definition
1. Individual, No prior relationship, Paid	An individual with whom the child had <i>no</i> prior personal relationship with care at least 5 hours weekly.
2. Individual, Prior relationship, Paid	An individual with whom the child had a prior personal relationship receives payment for caring for the child and cares for the child at least 5 hours weekly.
3. Individual, Unpaid	An individual who does not receive payment for caring for the child, but provides care at least 5 hours weekly.
4. Center-based Early Care and Education	Corresponds to NSECE Center-Based Provider Sample. It includes all Head Starts, Public Pre-Ks, community-based child care, or any other care for children < 72 months that is not drop-in or single activity, and occurs at least 5 hours weekly.
5. Other Organizational Early Care and Education	Any regular organizational care not included in type of care 4 above, like after-school care to school-age children, drop-in care, single-activity, etc. Must occur at least 5 hours weekly.





#### **Other Nonparental Care**

Aggregate Type of Care	Definition
6. K-8 schooling	May not be considered nonparental care. Elementary schooling kindergarten through grade 8 during the school day, whether in a public or private setting.
7. Irregular ECE	Provider cares for child fewer than 5 hours weekly
8. All other setting unknown	Regular ECE setting, but we have inadequate information to assign the provider to one of the categories 1-6.
9. Parental Care	Not a type of nonparental care. Used only in the child calendar to indicate time slots not assigned to a nonparental care provider.





# Detailed Type of Care Coding

- Provider type questions (C5 series and C8 series)
- Provider Look-up (PLU)
- Collect address if not in PLU (C8 series)
- Coding providers and provider type (ptype)
- Assigning best ptype
- Assigning quality flags

<sup>\*</sup> Children may have more than one provider within a type of care (e.g., grandmother on Mondays and neighbor on Fridays, neither of them paid).







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### **Cost of Care**



# Parental Out-of-Pocket Costs

- Weekly direct charges plus any copay amount minus any subsidy paid directly to the household
  - >Available for regular arrangements only
  - Cost to HH may be \$0 because an outside person or agency pays the provider for care, or because no parents are charged (for example, public school pre-K or unpaid individual care)





### Cost (cont.)

- Imputation was carried out for a number of arrangements for types of care "center-based ECE" and "other organizational ECE" (HH\_IMPFLAG\_WEEKLY\_COST\_CARE\_X\_Y)
- If amount was reported for more than one child, amount distributed equally among children
- Cost may be negative

# Lining up NSECE HH Calendar Data for Analysis

On Monday and for every 15-minute interval...

### Schedule

- Variables are found in Main Public Use file, Quick Tab files, and in the public use Calendar file.
- Measures that could be constructed:
  - > Number of hours in reference week
  - ➤ Any evening/weekend hours
  - >% of nonparental hours by type of care





# Useful Calendar-related Variables

- Availability of child calendar data: HH\_MISSING\_STATUS\_CC\_X (X=child 1-9)
- HH uses Parental Care Only: PCONLY

For each time slot, calendar file lists provider for child. That provider can be matched to this variable:

- Provider X ID: HH\_PTYPE\_X
  - O Data unavailable
  - 1-15: Provider is a HH member; HH roster number matches 1-15 value
  - 16-30: Provider added at C1A\_LIST
  - 31-45: Provider is a not-last-week provider added at C3/C4







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### **Distances**



#### **Provider Locations Collected**

- Location of a regular ECE provider
  - > matching to the sampling frame
  - >from respondent reports of address
- Location data disproportionately missing for individual providers with prior personal relationships to child






### Data Available

- Public use: categorical distance from home to ECE provider
- Restricted use (L1): continuous distance from home to ECE provider
- Others possible (L2 restricted use):
  - >distances between HH's ECE providers
  - >distances from parental employment to HH and/or ECE providers

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### Other issues



### School-age Children

- Calendar and type of care information for school-age children can describe the extent to which traditional ECE covers school-age children outside of school.
  - ➤ Incidence of self-care?
  - ➤ Use of single-activity and drop-in activities?
  - ➤ What care is received on-site at school?





#### Household-level Information

- The variable HH\_PTYPE\_X can identify providers for multiple children in the household
- Different children may receive different types of care from same provider (e.g., Head Start and elementary school)
- How does the combination of children's ages affect households' ECE use?





## Parent-like Relationships

- Respondents had some discretion in determining parental vs nonparental care.
  - Care by non-custodial parents (should be listed as providers)
  - Care by parents' spouse/partner within the household, especially in households where not all children have the same biological parents
  - ➤ Care by parent figure/guardian when no parent in the household (guardian generally listed as providing parental care)



# Weekly Hours in Center-based ECE by Combination of Care Used and Household Poverty Ratio, Ages 0 through 35 Months Old


