
The NOW Innovation Forum is a national network of peer communities working to promote child wellbeing and prevent early childhood adversities.

Supports 10 selected communities over 18 months to build essential knowledge, skills, and tools to scale and sustain equitable transformation of early childhood, education, and health systems in their neighborhood, city, or county.

Building a Culture of Health through Project HOPE (Harnessing Opportunity for Positive, Equitable Early Childhood Development)

A multi-level and multi-pronged approach to generate real progress toward equitable outcomes for young children (prenatal to age five) and their families by:

- Building the capacity of local communities, state leaders, cross-sector state teams, and local coalitions to prevent social adversities in early childhood and promote child wellbeing.
- Fostering connections across communities and states that have multi-sector coalitions, networks, or initiatives committed to reducing inequities

Linking Immigrant Families with Early Childhood Education (LIFE) Project

- Location: New York City, NY
- Focus Community: Immigrant families in Bronx, East Harlem, Brooklyn
- Lead Agencies: New York Immigration Coalition, LSA Family Health Services, Masa, Fifth Avenue Committee
- Focus Areas:
 - Culturally responsive outreach and enrollment to empower immigrant families to access quality PreK and 3K that meets their needs (NYC DOE program)
 - Remove structural barriers to access family-sustaining support services
 - Advocate for DOE to adopt equitable policies and practices

- Strengthening the continuum of family centered maternal and child health services and supports
- Ongoing parent outreach/engagement and development of community voice
