# **Quality Rating System Standards About the Inclusion of Children with Special Needs**

A Quality Rating System (QRS) is a systemic approach to assess, improve, and communicate the level of quality in early care and education programs. Similar to rating systems for restaurants and hotels, QRS award quality ratings to early care and education programs that meet a set of defined program standards. These systems provide an opportunity for States to (1) increase the quality of care and education for children; (2) increase parents' understanding and demand for higher quality care; and (3) increase professional development of child care providers. QRS can also be an effective strategy for aligning components of the early care and education system for increased accountability in improving quality of care. All QRS are composed of five common elements: (1) standards; (2) accountability measures; (3) program and practitioner outreach and support; (4) financing incentives; and (5) parent/consumer education efforts. As of November 2006, 14 States (Colorado, District of Columbia, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Vermont) have a statewide QRS.

QRS standards are built on the foundation of child care licensing requirements and add multiple steps between licensing and higher quality standards, such as accreditation standards. Of the 14 States with a QRS, three have quality standards related to the inclusion of children with special needs in programs participating in the QRS. The program must welcome children and families of all abilities and must modify the program and make reasonable accommodations to maintain children with special needs in the program.	Written documentation that explains the inclusive policy and demonstrates that the program welcomes children and families of all abilities, makes modifications and reasonable accommodations to maintain children with special needs in the program, and supports employed staff in their professional development. The documentation may include a statement in your parent/family handbook with the applicable pages highlighted, promotional materials, and/or other written parent communication.

This document has the following information about the early learning standards and criteria that child care centers must meet to reach steps one through three in the QRS. Within these standards, there is a requirement at Step Two that all children (except school-age children) receive a developmental screening within 60 days of enrollment. If needed, referrals must be completed within 90 days. Ohio's QRS applies only to child care centers at this time.

Ohio's State Licensing Regulations	Program must have a written plan in place for children who are transitioning from one group to another.  AND  All children are required to have a daily health check, a completed medical [exam], and, if needed, a health care plan.
Step One	Programs serving preschoolers must have a copy of Ohio's Early Learning Program Guidelines available for use.  At a minimum one copy of Ohio's Early Learning Content Standards, and/or Ohio's Infant Toddler Guidelines, and/or Ohio's K-12 Standards are available for use in each classroom dependent on the age of children served.  A formal transition process is utilized for when children enter, move within, and/or exit the program.
Step Two	Center has an identified curriculum and planning is aligned with the Infant/Toddler Guidelines and/or Ohio's Early Learning Content Standards and/or Ohio's K-12 Standards.  AND  All children (except school age) receive a developmental screening within 60 days of enrollment. Referrals, if needed, are completed within 90 days.  AND  Each classroom conducts an annual self-assessment using a tool relevant to the age of children served (ITERS, ECERS-R, ELLCO, SACERS <sup>[1]</sup> ).  AND  Children's progress is formally communicated with parents.  AND  A formal transition process is utilized for when children enter, move within, and/or exit the program.

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<sup>[1]</sup> ITERS = Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale; ECERS-R = Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale—Revised; ELLCO = Early Learning and Literacy Classroom Observation; SACERS = School-Age Care Environment Rating Scale.

Step Three	Center has an identified curriculum and planning is aligned with the Early Learning Content Standards, and/or Infant Toddler Guidelines, and/or Ohio's K-12 Standards, and utilizing on-going child assessment data.  AND  All children (except school age) receive a developmental screening within 60 days of enrollment. Referrals, if needed, are completed within 90 days.  AND  Program creates and implements an annual classroom action plan based on self-assessment results using the ITERS, ECERS-R, ELLCO, or SACERS.  AND  Children's progress is formally communicated with parents.  AND  A formal transition process is utilized for when children enter, move within, and/or exit the program.
